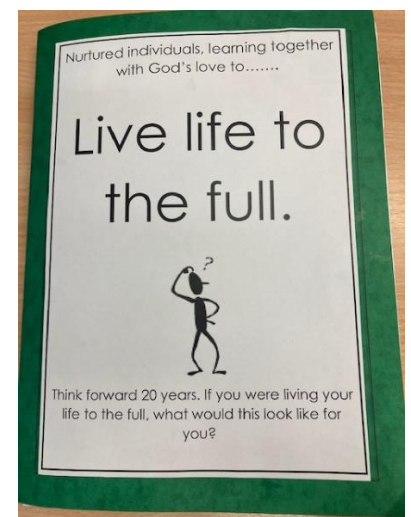
#### Vision Morning

### **Netball afternoon**

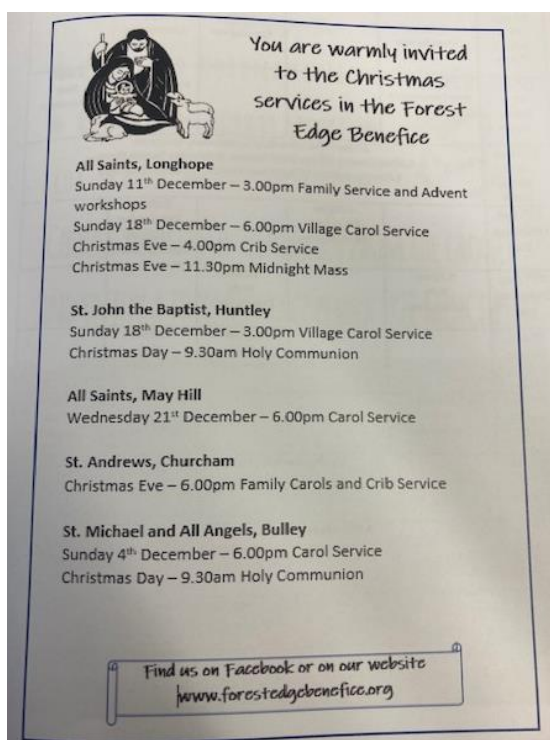

### Leadership and Management:

Our governor's quality of education committee met last week with a focus on the foundation subjects such as history and music.
