Attending school every day = 100% attendance

Attending 4½ days a week = 90% attendance
= 4 weeks missed per year.

Attending 4 days a week = 80% attendance
= more than half a term missed per year or 2 full years missed over the course of their school career.

Attending 3½ days each week = 70% attendance
= more than a quarter of the school year missed.

An average attendance of 80% or less across a child's school career adds up to missing a whole 2 years from school

Being late for school reduces learning time.

- If your child is 5 minutes late every day they will miss three days of learning each year.
- If your child is 15 minutes late every day they will miss 2 weeks of learning each year.

Class of the week. I am sure you have heard your child talking about Class of the week. I have asked some of the children to explain to new parents and carers what Class of the week is. At playtimes we can earn a blue rewards for showing a value such as kindness, being helpful and then yellow ones for lining up sensibly ready to go in. All the points are added up and we find out who is class of the week. We can choose golden time activities first so can get our favourite! Stream were class of the week last week!

Personal Development:

Celebrating success!

As a school we work in hard to make sure all the children's successes are celebrated aiming to develop an intrinsic want to do their best.

House gems: The children are awarded house gems for great work or showing our school values. They add them to their house's pot and we have a winner every week. The winning house this week was **Rowling** with 160 house gems!

Golden time: As a school we choose to have a Golden Time on a Friday afternoon. During this time the children get to choose from a wide range of activities which range from crafts, dance, films or extra playtime outside. This is linked to our school behaviour policy and Golden time can be lost if a positive change has not been made after a reminder. This does not happen very often but is occasionally used. Golden time is a lovely end to the week and the children mix across the school.

Star of the day: In Class Stream they have a star of the day given at the end of each day to a child who has worked particularly hard, achieved a goal, shown resilience or another of our school values.

Lunchtimes stickers are given out rewarding good manners in the lunch hall. These life skills are something we work hard to promote.

Other celebrations- These all run alongside our awards given out in merit assemblies which include writer of the week and merit certificates linked to school values. We also celebrate 99 club and Numbot successes, reading challenge completion and in Class River hand writer of the week. Whole class awards are sometimes given out to celebrate the success of a whole class or year group.

Achievements outside of school: During Merit assemblies we also celebrate children's successes outside of school and love to hear about these. Please continue to send in certificates etc or just information about successes outside of school for us to celebrate and add to our achievements board.
